Dear Ms. Mitchell:

This letter is written as a very strong endorsement for Prof. Cameron Man to receive the ASLA Medal. There is no one, now active in the profession, who is more deserving of this honor. He has helped define the profession of landscape architecture and professional education in both Canada and the United States. He has led the Canadian Society, the American Society of Landscape Architects and the Council of Educators in Landscape Architecture as President, has been chairman of three major landscape architectural education programs and has interacted with every great landscape architect in both countries for more than half a century. Prof. Man is a veritable encyclopedia in his knowledge of the profession with personal acquaintance with all of the leaders and the trends for the last 60 years. In fact he is the only person to ever hold those three positions and he has done it when all three were growing and expanding, thanks to his leadership. Cameron Man is a giant in this field and should be recognized as such by being awarded the ASLA Medal for 2006. He certainly ranks with those who have been so recognized in the past.
