## Dear Carolyn:

It gives me great pleasure to place in nomination Rep. Earl Blumenauer, Hon. ASLA, for the ASLA's Olmsted Medal. For his entire public life Rep. Earl Blumenauer has championed issues that resonate with landscape architects. From bicycle and pedestrian paths to sustainable storm-water management, Rep. Blumenauer has long stood with ASLA on issues of importance in creating sustainable, livable communities.

A lifelong resident of Portland, Oregon, Blumenauer has devoted his career to public service, beginning in 1972 when he was first elected to the Oregon Legislature. After serving three terms, Rep. Blumenauer went on to be a Multnomah County Commissioner and spent ten years on the Portland City Council as Commissioner of Public Works where he consistently championed causes that contributed to the enhanced livability and quality of life in Oregon. In each of these elected positions, Rep. Blumenauer's reforms and innovative accomplishments helped his hometown gain an international reputation as a livable community.

First elected to the U.S. Congress in 1996, Congressman Blumenauer proudly represents Oregon's 3<sup>rd</sup> Congressional district which encompasses large parts of the city of Portland and extends east to scenic Mount Hood. A leading environmental advocate both in Oregon and Congress, Congressman Blumenauer has authored and co-sponsored legislation to preserve and protect public lands, shift the nation's energy policy towards renewable energy and energy efficiency, curb global warming, and clean our nation's water bodies. He currently serves on the House Budget Committee, and has a senior position on the House Ways and Means Committee. In the past he has served on the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee and the Foreign Affairs Committee, but he is perhaps best known in Congress as a champion of supporting stronger, more sustainable and livable communities. He leads the Congressional Livable Communities Task Force, and chairs the bi-partisan Congressional Bike Caucus and is often seen, in both Washington and in Portland, practicing what he preaches, on the seat of his bicycle. Congressman Blumenauer knows that bicycling and walking are important not only as basic

transportation modes, but for individual health, our environment, safe streets, and increasingly for the economic vitality of our communities.

During his tenure Rep. Blumenauer has been an author on dozens of pieces of legislation that support a range of public policies that align with ASLA's mission. Some specific examples include:

- The Active Community Transportation Act, introduced in 2010, which provides grants to communities to encourage the use of bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure.
- The Higher Education Sustainability Act, which authorizes a \$50 million competitive grant
  program to universities and institutions of higher education to develop, implement and evaluate
  sustainability curriculums, practices and academic programs, was incorporated as an
  amendment to Title VII of the Higher Education Act of 2007.
- The Water Protection and Reinvestment Act which provides a deficit-neutral source of revenue dedicated to replacing, repairing, and rehabilitating drinking water and wastewater treatment facilities as well as protecting users from rate spikes that will result if nothing is done to address the water infrastructure crisis.
- The "Fast Starts Act" which provides grant-funding to jumpstart streetcar projects around the country.
- "Safe Routes to High Schools" which extends the successful Safe Routes to Schools program to include high schools.

During the current debate over the Reauthorization of the Surface Transportation bill Rep. Blumenauer has forcefully advocated on behalf of the Transportation Enhancements (TE) Program, working to ensure that the largest federal funding source for bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure is not eliminated. He has also worked to ensure the continuation of the Federal Safe Routes to School partnership, which provides grants to communities to improve pedestrian infrastructure to ensure that students and families who walk to and from school do so safely. Finally he is working with leaders in the House and Senate to ensure that the Reauthorization proposals include Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) provisions that allow investments in bicycle and pedestrian improvements.

Rep. Blumenauer efforts were recognized in 2005 with a Global Sustainability Award from the Institute for Transportation and Development Policy and in 2006 with a Public Official's Award from the Water

Environment Federation. He is an honorary member of the American Society of Landscape Architects (2004), the American Institute of Architects (2008), and the American Society of Consulting Engineers (2008). In 2005 Congressman Blumenauer was named one of "The Top 25 Change Agents in Bicycling History," by the League of American Bicyclists.

Over the years Rep. Blumenauer has maintained close ties with ASLA leadership to discuss ways to work together and advance common agendas. He has supported ASLA's legislative goals and advocated these issues to many of his colleagues in the House and Senate. He has invited ASLA to participate in events and has made a point to introduce ASLA representatives to key House leaders and members in attendance. In honor of his many efforts on behalf of the Society and his lifelong commitment to environmental advocacy, it is with great pride that I nominate Rep. Earl Blumenauer for the Olmsted Medal.
