




What is Landscape Architecture?



Being a landscape architect requires years of education and experience and passing a national exam. They are licensed—just like doctors and engineers—to keep people safe and secure.

Landscape architects create public spaces like parks, plazas, and campuses that connect people. Within these spaces, they design ways to prevent dangerous flooding and keep communities cooler. They devise strategies to protect native plants and wildlife.

Landscape architects also create transportation systems that get people to where they need to go, safely. And they come up with ways to help remedy unfair designs of the past, like spaces that reconnect neighborhoods divided by highways.

Good design doesn't happen by accident. Landscape architects listen to the needs of each community and use science and technology to create spaces that everybody can enjoy. From small towns to the largest cities, landscape architects create the outdoor places we cherish.
