The mission of the Landscape Architectural Accreditation Board (LAAB) is to evaluate, advocate for, and advance the quality of education in landscape architectural programs.

LAAB is the accrediting organization for landscape architectural programs. As such, LAAB develops standards to objectively evaluate landscape architectural programs and judges whether a school's landscape architectural program is in compliance with the accreditation standards.

LAAB is comprised of landscape architecture practitioners and academicians, representatives from landscape architecture collateral organizations and public representatives. The collateral organizations are the American Society of Landscape Architects (ASLA), Council of Landscape Architectural Registration Boards (CLARB) and Council of Educators in Landscape Architecture (CELA).

- Substantial changes in their academic program
- Progress on recommendations from previous accreditation visits
- Students
- Graduates
- Budgets
- Faculty

Purpose

Annual reports from academic programs are used by LAAB to monitor significant changes and ongoing compliance with accreditation standards in each program between on-site visits. Aggregate data from the reports is used to track trends in landscape architecture education and to communicate with stakeholders, other landscape architecture professional associations and organizations, and the public.



Signifant Change Reported by Programs	Descriptions
	22 changes at 16 institutions impacting 13 graduate programs and 9 undergraduate programs:
A change in administrator	Several programs reported new chair appointments or the designation of interim chairs for reasons varying between retirements, resignations, and sabbatical. Programs also experienced the addition of coordinators to the administrative team such as program, curriculum, and administrative coordinators.
	This change impacts 22% of accredited programs.
	6 changes at 5 institutions impacting 1 graduate program and 5 undergraduate programs:
A change in administartive structure	Programs reported changes in program coordinator, department heads, and the addition of administrative staff. Other changes included a school and degree programs shift within the home college which included changes in administration and college name.
Major changes in curriculum	6 changes at 5 institutions impacting 3 graduate programs and 3 undergraduate programs:
	Programs reported curriculum changes such as modifications made to reflect university general education requirements, moving the professional practice course to a later point in the curriculum, the addition of a research and teaching extension to support research and fieldwork, terminal project/thesis format review to align with the professional context, reductions from 5 to 4 year undergraduate programs, and the removal of a BSLA program.
	9 changes at 5 institutions impacting 4 graduate programs and 5 undergraduate programs:
A loss of 20% of faculty in the past year	Several programs have experienced retirements within their programs, the loss of tenure-track faculty, and faculty moving between institutions. The loss of tenure-track faculty has added additional administrative pressures to remaining tenure faculty. Some programs are conducting searches for tenure-track or have re-balanced their pool with non-tenure faculty, adjuncts, and PhD students. A non-tenure to tenure attempt was reported as not awarded.
A change in resources impacting delivery of the degree	3 changes at 2 institutions impacting 2 graduate programs and 1 undergraduate programs:
	One program institution reported the reallocation of resources during school separations and the other reported that they are no longer receiving general school funding and have been asked to use endowment funds to cover program costs.
Major changes in facilities	12 changes at 9 institutions impacting 6 graduate programs and 6 undergraduate programs:
	Building or campus relocations, additional off-site space, accessibility improvements, reclaimed studio space, loss in faculty office space, and equipment and furnishing improvements.














Tenure Related Faculty


