Re: Endorsement for Max Conrad to receive the Jot D. Teaching Medal

I first met Max Conrad when I arrived in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, to teach at LSU in 1966. As a westerner, being engulfed in the Louisiana landscape and culture was like moving to another country. Max was a highly educated young assistant professor at LSU, a graduate of the Harvard School of Design masters program who had traveled the world as the recipient of Harvard's Charles Elliott Travel Fellowship. Max is from New Orleans and attended LSU. He is a gentleman who exudes the best of Louisiana's marvelous rich culture and a patient listener who always responds thoughtfully, and with a smile. These are perfect gifts for anyone dedicated to teaching and are particularly valuable in teaching and pioneering the field of Landscape Architecture in Louisiana.

Dr. Reich's faculty in 1966 was excellent, and Max was the most patient. He had and still does have the capacity to give confidence to young students who have never ventured outside of Louisiana and to guide them to understand new ideas, places and cultures. He is also invaluable in helping students and faculty, like me, new to the region, to understand the richness and relevance of Louisiana's diverse people and landscapes. Max is an excellent, highly organized and purposeful designer and design teacher, but his influence goes beyond class work. Since 1966, he has quietly, when necessary, been a surrogate parent to students, always available to listen and offer direction to any of the personal or professional questions they ask. This engagement was particularly important early in Max's careen to help students facing new ways of thought and a broader perspective of the world. More recently, it has been valuable to the large percentage of international students attracted to LSU because of its international gateway location. Max provides this special personal contact by always being around the department and the class rooms evenings and weekends, fully accessible to students.

Student trips are legendary to LSU's landscape architecture graduates and exemplify Max's total commitment to his students. For forty-two years he has personally organized and led students on academic study tours to expose them to examples of landscape architectural and professional offices not available in Louisiana. Each year Max leads forty to sixty students on trips that alternate between the east and west coasts. These are low budget



tours that involve visiting offices and projects by day and often sleeping on office floors or busses traveling at night. We have hosted stops on the west coast trip at Design Workshop's Aspen office. Seeing the office and its work is part of Max's motivation for visiting Aspen; equally important is the life experience for many students of seeing snow, sleigh riding and skiing for the first time.

There are also trips to Europe and annual trips to Asia for alumni, students and other professionals. At the end of the Asia trips, students remain to intern in offices located in Japan, Thailand, Taiwan and China. Max is director of the university's LSU in Asia program. Max personally plans every detail of every trips hour by hour. He makes reservations for lodging and transportation hotel-by-hotel, airline-byairline and bus company-by-bus company to get the best prices and make these trips affordable. He personally contacts each professional office to be visited. Max wastes nothing and these educational study tours are rigorous in pace and content. The trips are not part of his regular teaching assignment and he seeks no compensation from participants.

In the process of visiting offices, Max has created employment contacts and provided a network of job placement for LSU students, alumni and professional offices looking for employees. Since 1995, he has provided a network of placement opportunities on his own web page. He does this without compensation and takes great pleasure in successfully connecting people to each other.

Max Conrad's life is dedicated to educating and guiding landscape architectural students. Everything he has done is commitment to the growth and development of students. He has done this through organized rigorous coursework and by always being there for students. People who know the inner workings of the landscape architecture department at LSU have known and loved Doctor Reich for the lifetime he spent as the spiritual leader of the landscape architecture department. They also know that for forty two of those years Max has been a constant force behind "Doc" making much of the vision work.

I knew Jot Carpenter and understood the educational and professional values he stood for. I am also close friends, having studied or worked closely with past Jot Carpenter medal recipients Terry Harkness, Robert "Doc" Reich, Craig Johnson and Tony Barnes. I know their excellence in the classroom, their commitment to the growth and development of students, their consistent availability and special sensitivity to students needs and their passion for education in landscape architecture that they all hold in common. Max Conrad is one of these people. His lifelong work has been totally consistent with the values, character and success as educators that distinguish Jot, Terry, Doc, Craig, Tony from others.
